# How we have been working on a day-to-day basis

From 7 February 2013 (when the Department for Education (DfE) published its Draft National Curriculum for History) until 16 April 2013 (when the DfE's Consultation Period closed), the daily work of Curriculum for Cohesion revolved, in particular, around making our formal response to the UK Government's Draft National Curriculum for History.

This response was drafted by Dr. Matthew Wilkinson using philosophical, textual and historical analysis. It was reviewed by the entire Academic Team before it was sent to the Department for Education on 20th

Lucy Wilkinson as Curriculum for Cohesion Project Director, worked tirelessly to draw together the logistics for this media roundtable with busy, highprofile politicians and academics.

This event generated coverage of Curriculum for Cohesion in the Times Educational Supplement, The Economist and the BBC Online.

Subsequently, Dr. Wilkinson appeared on BBC Radio 4's Moral Maze and BBC Radio 4's Sunday programme and on the Islam Channel to discuss Curriculum for Cohesion's Response to the Draft National Curriculum for History. Mohammed Amin appeared twice on the BBC Asian Network.

During this period, Curriculum for Cohesion became a significant public voice in the call that we shared with others for necessary changes to the DfE's Draft.

In July 2013, the DfE published a list of 612 organisations that responded to the National Curriculum in England Framework Document covering National Curriculums in English, Mathematics, Science, Art & Design, Citizenship, Computing, Design & Technology, Geography, History, Languages, Music and Physical Education:

Of these, only 11 (listed below) appear to be significantly Muslim-influenced.

This Muslim ratio of 1.8% contrasts with roughly 5% of the British population being Muslim, and illustrates the



need for Muslims to be more engaged with national developments and initiatives such as Curriculum for Cohesion

Of the above listed organisations, four (Curriculum for Cohesion, Curriculum Enrichment for the Future, Federation of Muslim Organisations and the Muslim Council of Britain) either based their submission on our document or were organisations that have had direct contact with us. We cannot tell if any of the others were influenced by our wider media communications.

Since April until the present, Dr. Matthew Wilkinson has focused again on the production of the book Islamic Critical Realism: educating Muslims in the multi-faith World in conversation, in particular, with Professor Roy Bhaskar and Dr. Ed Kessler. At present, he has written three (of eleven) chapters in an advanced state of drafting.

This work was punctuated by a well-received Teacher-Training session at the University of Cambridge's Faculty of Education in June entitled, The case for inclusive school History.

This helped 25 teachers understand how the inclusion of the Muslim and other faith contributions to history can improve the quality of historical knowledge enjoyed by all children in English schools and put this approach into practice. It was warmly applauded at the end by the teacher-trainees.

The Course-Convenor, Ms. Kath Goudie, kindly attended our 2013 Annual Curriculum for Cohesion Dinner and we are now in discussion about how Curriculum for Cohesion will contribute to the University of Cambridge's History Teacher-Training sessions in the 2013-14 academic year.

The period culminated in our excellent 2013 Curriculum for Cohesion Annual Dinner at the Royal Over-Seas League on Tuesday, 25<sup>th</sup> June of which more details are below.







#### Particular successes include

# The Department for Education listens to Curriculum for Cohesion.

In July 2013, the Department for Education responded to the submissions that it had received during the National Curriculum Public Consultation Period, including that from Curriculum for Cohesion.

By 8<sup>th</sup> August 2013, Curriculum for Cohesion will make a detailed response to this revised July National Curriculum in England Framework Document.

The DfE's July draft is greatly improved from the February version and shows that the DfE has taken on board the key points that Curriculum for Cohesion and other stakeholders made in our response to the DfE's February draft of the National Curriculum for History:

1. The July draft is far less prescriptive for teachers. While everything set out in the February draft would have been mandatory, the July draft comprises a high level structure in black text which is mandatory, and then proceeds to list a number of items in grey text that teachers may wish to teach but which will not be mandatory.

This structure, while sticking to a basic chronological approach, leaves scope for more interesting teaching that will prepare pupils for multi-cultural Britain, including scope for using the material that Curriculum for Cohesion is developing.

- 2. The July draft is much more age-appropriate. The absurdly abstract conceptual language at Key Stages 1 and 2 of the February draft has been made more age-appropriate and the detail of the suggested content at all the Key Stages is much more teachable and learnable. This will help pupils derive benefit from their History education.
- 3. The July draft is more diverse, including statutory mention of some history of Islamic civilisation. For example, 10th century Baghdad and Benin (in a period when Muslim) are mentioned in statutory sections.



4. There is still plenty of room for improvement which we are going to put to the Department for Education in our formal response by 8th August. In brief, more thought still needs to be go into how the national British history relates to the world history and how to create a 'broader, truer history for all.'

# Lecturing on the University of Cambridge PGCE Teacher-Training Programmes for History and Religious Education

As a result of the success of the sessions in helping teacher-trainees on the University of Cambridge



Teacher-Training PGCE Programmes in History and Religious Education, Ms. Mary Earl Lecturer in Religious Education, has invited Curriculum for Cohesion to increase its input into her work to three sessions in the coming academic year.

The last of these will be a seminar aimed at a group of teachers from the USA who are interested to find out about the work being done in Religious Education in the UK for multi-faith contexts. This means the ideas and teaching practices developed by Curriculum for Cohesion are starting to reach an international audience.

Dr. Matthew Wilkinson is also shortly to begin negotiations with Ms. Kath Goudie, the Course Convenor for the University of Cambridge's Teacher-Training PGCE Programme in History to increase our input into the History PGCE next year.

This increased commitment to Teacher-Training will coincide with the publication by Routledge of the Curriculum for Cohesion book for teachers, Islamic Critical Realism: educating Muslims in the multi-faith World.

On pages 15-18 of this report, we outline the work carried out this year in greater detail.

### Looking Ahead

An important six months for the project lies ahead.

The most important task of this period be the completion of the book Islamic Critical Realism: educating Muslims in the multi-faith World which will be a full-time commitment in order to submit the manuscript to Routledge Publishers by the first quarter of 2014.
